St. SABAS, abbot

Memorial

Sabas was born in Mutalasca near Caesarea in Cappadocia, now Turkey, in 439. While still young, he embraced monastic life. In 457, he went to Jerusalem to visit the holy places, and later spent some time in Egypt, then withdrew into the wilderness of Judea, where he founded several monasteries or lauras the purpose of which was to combine the advantages of solitude with those of common life. The largest of these lauras still bears his name: Mar Saba.

He was ordained priest in 491 by the Patriarch of Jerusalem, but he continued in monastic life, became an archimandrite and one of the great figures of Palestinian monasticism. Faithful to the Council of Chalcedon, he had much to suffer in the struggle for faith in Jesus, true God and true man. He died on December 5th, 532, and his body, which was returned from Venice in 1965, now rests in the great church of the monastery.

" I will lead her into the desert and speak to her heart. " (Hosea 2: 13b). As he had once seduced his people in the wilderness, God continues to call men and women to a life of solitude. The hermit belongs only to God: he renounces all the pleasures and security of this world, for he must comply with the absolute requirements of the divine. He is dedicated to the worship of God alone. And yet, in his prayer, the whole Church, the world, are constantly present.

It is this call of the absolute St. Sabas had heard and experienced in a radical way, taking the words of Christ literally: "For whoever wishes to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will find it. " (Mt 16, 25)
